1. Best Kept Village Competition. The judges came to make the first inspection of the village on Tuesday 2nd July. They were very impressed with the appearance of the whole village and high marks were awarded for each item; they particularly praised the condition of the Churchyard, the appearance of the Green and Lays, and the absence of litter. So we have entered the second round. The judges from the County Council will be coming on FRIDAY next 12th JULY to see if Tostock can go forward to the final round in the week commencing 21st July.

Owing to the good work of the litter wardens, organised by Mr. Stephen Guylas, and of three altruistic residents, unnamed, unsung, but each with a halo, there was not one speck of litter to be seen in Tostock when the judges came!

It is very gratifying to see how well the residents are co-operating, both in their private gardens and in assisting generally. Nearly all hedges have been trimmed and the judges remarked on the beauty of our gardens. There are one or two things that require to be done before the next judging; for instance the Village Hall forecourt needs attention and so does the entrance to the Rectory. And most important, everyone is implored not to throw bits of paper around.

2. Tostock Gardens Competition. This is a Tostock Competition got up by Tostock people for Tostock gardens only. The judges are:-
