November 5th Bonfire. The Parish Council at their meeting on October 8th decided that the bonfire should not be located in the usual place on the Lays. Instead, Mr. Henderson has kindly given permission for it to be on the Go-Kart Track in his park. An opening, which everyone can use, will be made to give access from New Road.

2. Coal Charity. The following IMPORTANT announcements have been made by the Trustees:-

- a. They will consider applications for the gift of coal firstly from those whose title is undoubted; such as needy widows and pensioners; and secondly from those whose participation must be considered by the Trustees.
- b. Applications for this year's distribution of coal must be made to the Rector before 31st October.

THOSE WHO DO NOT APPLY WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED BY THE TRUSTEES FOR GIFTS OF COAL.

- c. Payments for Allotments by tenants for the year ending 31st October 1963 are to be made to Mr. R.I. Mulley on the same terms as last year.
- d. The Trustees have reviewed the Allotments and tenancies, and an up-to-date list of tenants has been made. The rent for Allotments has been increased to 10/- for 20 rods. Payment for the year 31st October 1963 to 31st October 1964 is to be made in advance on 31st October 1963 to Mr. Mulley.
- e. In future tenants will not be allowed to sub-let; if they do not want their Allotment for the coming year they must inform Mr. Mulley or the Rector before 31st October of the year when payment is due.

3. Best Kept Village. As has been announced the Best Kept Village Fund has a balance in hand of £24:14:7d., after paying expenses in connection with the unveiling Ceremony on 29th August. This sum will be used for keeping up the appearance of the village until the next Competition in 1965. The moving of greens and freedom from litter are two important items. The former will be done as before by the kindness of those who lend machines and those who use them, under the supervision of Mr. Mann and Mr. Armstrong. Arrangements for keeping the village free of litter have been made by Captain Errington assisted by Mr. Sidney Allen and by three Cherubims and one Seraphim.

The Parish Council has decided that the Lawn Mower presented by Suffolk Iron Foundry shall be kept and cared for by Mr. V. Hiffey in the Village Hall, and he has kindly consented to do this. The machine can be borrowed but only with the written permission of the Chairman of the Parish Council.

The three trees presented by Messrs R.C. Notcutt Ltd. will be sited by Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Mann and Captain Errington.
